



2022 Connecticut Summer Youth Employment Program Overview




In the 2022 program, **3,016** youth were served across the state, which is a decline of **54%** from our 2010 service level. Increases in the CT minimum wage and program operation costs have increased the funding required to serve each youth.


NUMBERS & STATISTICS

The average cost per participant across the five WDB was \$2,576.00









DEMOGRAPHIC INFORMATION

SUMMER YOUTH SUCCESS STORIES & STATEMENTS

In general, youth who participate in the SYEP receive work-readiness, career competencies, career exploration and real-work experiences. Youth typically earn a stipend or wage between \$12.00 and \$14.00 per hour. The average amount of hours worked per week is 15-25 hours for 5-8 weeks varying by region.

The following youth success stories and testimonials illustrate the positive impact that the SYEP had on them during the 2022 Summer.



"I liked how the program trusted us youth with a job and provided us this opportunity that not many could do." Jakari Freeman, a prior participant in the Middlesex Chamber Youth @ Work program, had completed a Summer employment experience with the Russell Library in Middletown, CT. He continued to work there as an Assistant and was recently hired full-time with benefits at the Russell Library.

Additionally, the program (Workforce Alliance, Inc. - CYEP through the Middlesex Chamber) have several youth that are now employees at Middlesex Health in Middletown at the hospital.

Ms. Parker came to the CareerHub in early 2022. She successfully enrolled in CareerHub's Summer Youth Earn and Learn Employment Program. Ms. Parker enjoyed her summer worksite at Burlington Stores Inc. in Stratford, CT as a Sales Floor Associate. She completed the summer internship in August with a favorable report from the employer. Ms. Parker then enrolled in CareerHub's Year-Round Training & Employment Program in August 2022. The CareerHub staff admires drive and desire of Ms. Parker to care for others. At 19 years old, she finds herself aspiring to assist, care, and advocate for others due to her own personal experiences and involvement as a DCF youth. In October 2022, Ms. Parker obtained an internship opportunity at Bennan Industries in Bridgeport, CT as a Clerical Assistant. Her worksite supervisor has nothing but great things to say about Ms. Parker and her work ethic. As Ms. Parker focuses on her internship and explores training opportunities, CareerHub staff is pleased to assist such a pleasant, driven, and dedicated young lady.

Employer Success Stories:

YMCA-Ralphola Taylor Community Center

"Not trying to give away my age, but I remember the Ralphola Taylor Center form when I was little girl. It was an agency that brought life to an otherwise desolate area. Since its inception, the center has focused on Youth Development, Healthy Living, and Social Responsibility. This past summer, they employed 14 of our Youth in various positions ranging from Aids to maintenance. They even found funding to hire one of our youth permanently. The Supervisor of the program, Isaac Van, was instrumental in teaching our Youth the value of work and commitment. Per Isaac, "it is important that the participants do not just show up to work, but that they learn something new every day, while they are there". Due to our relationship with this YMCA group, we were invited to the ribbon cutting of Hernan's Haven, a permanent supportive housing program that is overseen by the YMCA. Their newest building located on Boston Avenue. has 11 units that will be open to Young Adults ages 18-24. While there, we have been invited to work with the participants to support them in connecting with skills training opportunities that will assist them in gaining employment."





2022-2023 Connecticut Summer Youth Employment Program Update: Call to Action




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*These years were used as a decade comparison of summer youth served trends.
